





In 2008, Tim DeChristopher, known as Bidder #70, derailed the Bush Administration's last minute, widely disputed federal BLM Oil and Gas lease auction, effectively safeguarding thousands of acres of pristine Utah land surrounding Dinosaur National Monument and Arches and Canyonlands National Parks. Bidding \$1.7 million, Tim won 22,000 acres of land with no intention to pay or drill. (USA, 73 min)

DOCTORS OF THE DARK SIDE

Stories of four detainees and the doctors involved in their abuse demonstrate how US Army and CIA doctors implemented the Enhanced Interrogation Techniques and covered up signs of torture at Guantanamo and Abu Ghraib. Interviews with medical, legal, and intelligence experts and evidence from declassified government memos document what has been called the greatest scandal in American medical ethics. Each page echoes with the ebullient voice of a young man destined for a brilliant future. "Hayami is going to the top!" he declares in one diary entry. His life was to end when he joined the 442nd Regimental Combat Team—killed protecting his fellow soldiers. (Japan/USA, 26 min)

When invited to exhibit in Paris, she is at the mercy of her conservative husband: Will he let her go showcase her raw talent or give in to his sense of tradition and keep her home? Garments and accessories, mainly intended for the European market, bring in more than 350 million euros per year to Bangladesh. In archaic conditions, the workers work at least twelve hours a day for forty euros per month. Cancer, ulcers, and many other illnesses will catch and kill them before they are fifty. In 2001, a young art student posed the provocative question: "What kind of house does a man who has lived in a sixfoot-by-nine-foot cell for over thirty years dream of?" (Canada/USA, 81 min)

Emanuel has an unknown identity and is residing illegally in Norway. He claims to be from Liberia, but Norwegian authorities claim that Emanuel comes from Ghana and have forcibly sent him there twice. Each time, Ghana has returned him to Norway with the message that he is not Ghaneser. (Liberia/Norway, 52 min)

She was captured by the Gestapo, imprisoned, tortured and sentenced to death. She escaped on the day of execution. All 2,500 children rescued by her network survived the war. (Poland/UK/USA, 60 min)

In the depths of the Himalayas, seventeen-yearold Hari Rai regularly treks from village to village, hilltop to hilltop, with loads piled on his back. His most recent cargo is certainly the strangest: a primitive, red Coca-Cola fridge in need of repair. One of 60,000 Nepalese youths who work as porters, Hari carries cargo to make a living and pay for his education. He usually transports backpacks for tourists or serves as a messenger for families who cannot afford to visit each other. (Nepal/Serbia, 54 min)

THE LORD IS NOT ON TRIAL HERE TODAY

This is a personal story behind one of the most important and landmark First Amendment cases in US history, the case that established the separation of church and state in public schools. The film recounts a time that Vashti McCollum later described as "three years of headlines, headaches, and hatred," but which eventually led to a decision that still resonates in the church-state conflicts of today, sixty years after the original decision in McCollum vs. Board of Education. Love Free or Die is about a man named Gene Robinson whose two defining passions are in direct conflict: his love for God and for his partner Mark. Gene is the first openly gay man to become a bishop in the historic traditions of Christendom. His consecration in 2003, to which he wore a bullet-proof vest, caused an international stir, and he has lived with death threats every day since. (USA, 83 min)

Married in Washington, DC on June 2, 1958, Richard Loving and Mildred Jeter returned home to Virginia where their marriage was declared illegal—he was white, and she was black and Native American. At the time, anti-miscegenation laws were upheld in 16 states. The Lovings refused to leave one another and, with the help of the American Civil Liberties Union, took their case to the courts. (USA, 78 min)



THE WELL: WATER VOICES FROM ETHIOPIA

Each year, when the dry season reaches its peak in Southern Ethiopia, the Borana herders gather with their livestock around their ancient wells. Huge hand-excavated craters, known as "singing wells," allow them to survive during the long annual droughts, when thousands of people and animals move closer in search for survival. 




