UNAFF 2015 to screen **60 documentaries** for eleven days **October 15-25** spotlighting current events from across the globe including Afghanistan, Cuba, Ecuador, France, India, Iraq, Israel, Kenya, Libya, Nepal, Pakistan, Palestinian Territories, Rwanda, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, US and Yemen. Additional topics include:

the politics of poaching in Africa; rape in India and across American college campuses; drones as a tool of modern warfare; the fastest winter-warming place on earth; the global waste crisis; individuals with Parkinson's staging a first ever dance performance under the tutelage of the Mark Morris Dance Group; art's ability to overcome violence, poverty and isolation in Oakland, California; the history of Libya; the Greek financial crisis; an inside look at the girls of the Taliban; finding loopholes to perform abortions at sea for women with no other option; and a remarkable journey by 12 teens to confront racism and have the conversations most of us are too afraid to have.
