APRIL 9, 2018 - MON, 3 PM: SAUDI SOLUTIONS

DIR/PROD: Bregtje van der Haak (Saudi Arabia, USA, 77 min)

In Saudi Arabia, one of the most religiously conservative societies in the Middle East, women are not allowed to vote or to drive a car. Men and women are segregated in most public spaces and work environments. A strict dress code enforced by religious police mandates that women cover their heads and bodies in public, where they must always be accompanied by a husband or other male guardian. In Saudi Solutions, filmmaker Bregtje van der Haak is the first Western filmmaker ever granted permission to film the lives of Saudi women. She profiles several women with professional careers and asks them to explain what it means to be a modern woman in a fundamentalist Islamic society.

Angel Azul explores the artistic journey of Jason deCaires Taylor, an innovative artist who combines creativity with an important environmental solution; the creation of artificial coral reefs from statues he's cast from live models. When algae overtakes the reefs, however, experts provide the facts about the perilous situation coral reefs currently face and solutions necessary to save them. The film is narrated by Peter Coyote.
