Established in 1998 to honor the 50th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, UNAFF has grown and earned the respect of audiences and filmmakers alike for its fearless independence and integrity, in the process becoming one of the oldest purely documentary film festivals in the US. In addition to providing early outlets for films, many of which later went on to win major awards and accolades, including Academy Awards, UNAFF prides itself in creating a community forum for discovery and dialogue about different cultures, issues and solutions.

Martin Luther King; young people around the world to put Earth first; how we got to be so overloaded with chemicals; a new generation of startups led by minority women are seeking to solve agriculture's problems with tech innovation; all over the globe, catastrophic wild-fires are threatening not only our homes and our lives, but also the climate and our future.

UNAFF is committed not only to presenting films, but also providing opportunities for audience members to engage in ongoing dialogue about the subjects at hand. In an effort to retain the interactions of our physical edition, we are planning FREE daily Zoom Meetings with the filmmakers, film subjects and experts during the course of the festival.

UNAFF's mission has expanded to broad, year-round programs that augment its reach. In addition to the annual film festival, UNAFF organizes panel discussions, initiates programs that engage children, students, seniors, veterans, hosts a traveling festival which keeps the films alive well beyond their initial festival showings and opens its doors to documentary film students and researchers.



Patras Masih and Asia Bibi are on death row for committing Blasphemy - Patras for allegedly sharing blasphemous content on his friend's Facebook page, and Asia for allegedly uttering blasphemous words during an argument with a co-worker. Both are Christians, belonging to Pakistan's heavily targeted minority.



This film follows the work of a dedicated global community of scientists, firefighters, and fire experts as they light experimental fires in laboratories, study the history of our forests, and put under scrutiny the escalating range and impact of the blazes, from hidden smoldering fires deep inside the soil to smoke clouds reaching all the way up into the stratosphere.
