Established in 1998 to honor the 50th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, UNAFF has grown and earned the respect of audiences and filmmakers alike for its fearless independence and integrity, in the process becoming one of the oldest purely documentary film festivals in the US. As one of the few juried festivals on the circuit, UNAFF does not simply curate a list of films that have already been proven elsewhere, but allows newcomers and established creators alike to compete for a spot, which not only gives a chance to new voices, but also ensures a dynamic, vibrant and often surprising selection. In addition to providing early outlets for films, many of which later went on to win major awards and accolades, including Academy Awards, UNAFF prides itself in creating a community forum for discovery and dialogue about different cultures, issues and solutions.

At a time when divisions here and abroad are more ominous than ever, this year's theme SHARED HUMANITY continues our devotion to humar rights with an emphasis on our common destiny and issues fostering it, or standing in its way.

For eleven days, UNAFF will present 60 documentary films from across the globe, of them 57 percent made by women filmmakers and 54 percent by filmmakers of color. It will spotlight current events from around the world, including Afghanistan, Austria, Australia, Bangladesh, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Chile, El Salvador, Egypt, France, Germany, Guatemala, Honduras, Iceland, India, Iraq, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Kenya, Malawi, Mexico, Netherlands, New Zealand, Palestine, Rwanda, Senegal, Serbia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Tanzania, Turkey, Uganda, UK, Ukraine, US, Venezuela and Zambia.

The 27h UNAFF Visionary Award will be presented to award-winning filmmaker, actor, author, photographer, political activist and environmentalist Matthew Modine. This year one of the Opening Night's films is Matthew Modine's RIPPLE EFFECT about protection of the world's oceans and sea life. Another one, SLUDGE: A PFAS UPRISING about farmers who are speaking up about "forever chemicals" poisoning their land, water, and livestock and ruining their livelihoods, is executively produced by Matthew Modine. These two are added to three more of his incredible documentaries presented throughout the UNAFF history: JESUS WAS A COMMIE (UNAFF2014), THE BRAINWASHING OF MY DAD (UNAFF2016) and DOWNWIND (UNAFF2023). Matthew has worked in the environmental sector for more than three decades. He studied oceanography and has been a passionate advocate for protection of the world's oceans and human rights issues. He is the founder of Bicycle for a Day (BFAD), which has a mission to encourage bicycling as a way toward better health and environmental sustainability. Matthew Modine joins previous Visionary Award recipients such as Academy Award Winner and United Nations Messenger of Peace, Michael Douglas, Congresswoman Barbara Lee; human rights activist, actor and singer Harry Belafonte; singer and human rights activist Joan Baez, Academy Award Nominee and women's rights advocate Dorothy Fadiman; Silicon Valley pioneers William Draper III and Franklin "Pitch" Johnson; philanthropist Juliette Feeney-Timsit and Secretary General of the United Nations Ban Ki Mun.

UNAFF is committed not only to presenting films, but also providing opportunities for audiences to engage in ongoing dialogue about the subjects at hand. In addition to 40 filmmakers available for Q&A, six free panel discussions will take place during the course of the festival, addressing issues such as climate and criminal justice, racism and hate, making peace during the war and the power of art to inspire social change.

UNAFF's mission has expanded to broad, year-round programs that augment its reach. In addition to the annual film festival, UNAFF organizes panel discussions, initiates programs that engage children, students, seniors, veterans, hosts a traveling festival which keeps the films alive well beyond their initial festival showings and opens its doors to documentary film students and researchers.

We are convinced that the 60 films which our jury has selected for you from our 600 submissions will offer you excitement, exhilaration, answers to many questions, and pose even more new ones, while shrinking the world and allowing you to embrace it through SHARED HUMANITY. We thank you all for your encouragement and with your support we hope to continue UNAFF and its programs in 2025.



Once they enter sanctuary, they physically do not leave the church grounds until they attain legal status, a process that can take years. ICE is currently practicing a 'sensitive locations' policy, which dictates not to enforce deportations in houses of worship and creates a temporary refuge for immigrants facing deportation. At the heart of the film is Maksut Maksutović Maksa, the renowned teacher of Roma trumpeters, who crafted authentic jazz arrangements and provided livelihoods for many musicians. (46 min) Serbia

### JUDGING JURIES

DIR/PROD: Abby Ginzberg In California, jurors receive \$15 per day for jury duty. In Mississippi, they receive \$5 per day and in New York state they receive \$40 per day. Clearly, this payment schedule needs to be revised, particularly if jury duty requires the possibility of missed weeks of work without compensation. Many prospective jurors are not paid by their employers for jury service and therefore face real financial hardship if forced to serve for \$15 per day. An innovative program in San Francisco called Be the Jury, which pays jurors \$100 per day, has discovered that many more working people and people of color are able to serve as a result of this increase in compensation. Traumatized by both the assault itself and her treatment by the police and prosecutor, Madison never wavered from the conviction that her attacker must be held accountable.

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


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


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
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# 27th UNAFF Visionary Award Honors Matthew Modine
